## National Association of Clean Air Agencies Survey on MATS Compliance Extension Requests

## May 1, 2014

The Mercury and Air Toxics Standards (MATS), issued on December 21, 2011 (published in the *Federal Register* on February 16, 2012<sup>1</sup>), are intended to limit emissions of mercury, acid gases and other toxic pollution from power plants. MATS calls for a three-year compliance period for existing sources, with a deadline of April 16, 2015, but provides for an extra year, upon request, for sources that need additional time to comply.

The National Association of Clean Air Agencies (NACAA)<sup>2</sup> conducted a survey to determine how many facilities had requested one-year MATS compliance extension requests (under 40 CFR 63 Subpart UUUUU) from state and local agencies and how many requests have been granted. The following table contains information from 58 agencies in 45 states, DC and Puerto Rico. According to the responses, 107 facilities have made extension requests, of which 98 have been granted, five are under consideration, two were returned to the facilities for additional information and two been denied, to date. The respondents indicated that approximately six more requests may be forthcoming. According to EPA's Regulatory Impact Analysis, there are 460 coal-fired power plants that are affected by the MATS rule.
